He looked forward to Easter, not just because of the sugary promise of special treats, but also the warmth of spring after a typical harsh Chicago winter.

But last year, the grade schooler discovered a more important promise thanks to a simple Easter Bag: the hope of salvation!

The bag was a gift from Cru® serving in the inner city. They partner with area churches and ministries to bless children experiencing poverty. Easter Bags include candy, toys, crayons, a gospel bead bracelet that explains the plan of salvation, and a booklet designed to introduce children to Jesus.

Elder Cora Smith, with Christian Fellowship Refuge Ministries, a partner of Cru Inner City, brought one of the Easter Bags to the home of Diane, Jaseon's grandmother. While visiting with the two, Cora gave Jaseon the simple white bag filled with goodies.

When Jaseon opened the bag, he glanced inside, pulling out the bead bracelet and the book, "4 Keys 4 Kids," a gospel presentation designed for children. As the women chatted, he soaked up every word of the booklet before his grandmother called him to the table to eat.

As they started to eat, Jaseon stopped them. "I



gotta say grace," he said.

His grandmother, known to use spicy language, responded with a curse word. "You can't say that," Jaseon declared. "I'm saved now!"

The 3 "Rs" of Inner-City Ministry: Reading, Relationship, Redemption!

Jerry and Regina were looking for answers for their two young daughters.

Despite Alyssa's and Angel's best efforts, they just weren't reading at grade level.

So when the parents heard about Communion Chapel's weekly Feed and Read summer program, they attended an orientation meeting to learn

more. And they liked what they heard: volunteers would work with the kids each midday, Monday through Friday. And the kids would receive a free lunch.

"They would have a reading program for 30 minutes where they would read, do word recognition, sight recognition," said Mark Vera, who with his wife, Gloria, serves as local team director for the inner-city ministry of Cru® in San Antonio. The couple decided to partner with the reading outreach to launch Cru's new presence in the south Texas city.

The reading program uses the Bible to improve the students' skills. "Do you read anything other than the Bible?" Jerry asked the pastor. "Because we're not into this Jesus religious thing."

"No, we're a church, and that's the book that we're reading," the pastor kindly responded.

Despite their concerns, the couple enrolled their girls.

They soon discovered the program was about more than just improving their daughters' reading skills.

The girls made friends with other children enrolled in the program. They looked forward to going every day. *And Regina did too*. Although there was no cost to the six-week program, it required at least one parent attend the daily sessions.

Over the course of the summer, Regina and her girls built beautiful relationships with others in their community as their hearts were also softened toward the gospel.

By the time the program ended, Jerry and Regina were involved in a mid-week Bible study and a small group. Together for 15 years, the couple decided to be obedient to Scripture and married during a Sunday service.

"All of their extended family came and were there to witness them getting married," Gloria said. "A lot

of their family was surprised — 'we never thought this would happen.'"

Last summer, Regina once again committed to the six-week

Feed and Read program — this time, reading to other children! She also helped with Cru's annual PowerPack® distribution and other community outreaches.

Laying Preferences at the Cross



There is a position in boxing called the corner man, which is described as a counselor, strategist, nutritionist, and medic. His sole job is to keep the boxer moving, so at the sound of the bell he can make it back to the middle of the ring for more action.

There ought to be a high demand for corner men in

all aspects of life. We seem to spend most of our lives hanging out in our own corners, unwilling to migrate to the middle.

My daughter recently broached a question with me as we were talking about objective truth, and its opposite, subjective truth.

"Dad, what happens when 'me doing me' and 'you doing you' clash? When we are all following our own 'truth,' whose truth gets to trump the other?"

I've been pondering this since she brought it up. It's a powerful question. In the end, they both cancel each other out. If we don't believe there is an objective truth that transcends how we posture ourselves, then we reach a stalemate.

It is a hopeless scenario.



The Truth is this: Jesus is an excellent corner man. He keeps us moving forward, toward the middle of the ring of life. His life and deity offer a strong example for us to follow.

In those moments when we are nice and toasty in the safety of our corners, what if we rely on Him, and ask, "Jesus, what would you have me to do?"

Do I live and die on my truth? Forsake community and relationship to stand firm on what I believe?

Jesus would say, "Move to the middle! Treat the other person with kindness and love, follow the Golden Rule."

Such a response prevents us from being so caught up in "me doing me" that we can't see how that negatively impacts others.

When "you do you" — to the expense and eradication of community — a lot of people get hurt. Everyone ends up isolated. Community is the higher value. Community only works when we all lay our preferences at the Cross, not because everyone thinks the same, but because we make the effort to be like Jesus.

So, how do we experience unity in being diverse? The answer is found in Philippines 2:1-7, where Paul calls us to prioritize others first.

This a good Word for us, because it calls us out of our corner, our comfort zone, and into the middle of the ring. The goal? Showing love amid diversity. Forsaking our "me doing me" to foster unity, empowering us to share the message of John 14:6, *Jesus* as the way, the truth, and the life.

Join me in the middle?
