Welcome to Revival Tabernacle! We hope your stay and ministry time is one that is not only memorable, but life changing!

Below is a list of facility information to help assist you in your time with us.

Our facility can accommodate two sleeping locations. Our upstairs children's ministry area and our gymnasium. We have bathrooms located in both areas. Showers are located in the gymnasium bathroom area. It is up to your team to decide the guy/girl sleeping locations and shower schedules. Please ensure all utilized areas are cleaned and put back together at the end of your stay.

During service times, which are Sundays at 10am, we request that sleeping bags and personal belongings be packed up and stored in classroom 3, in the children's ministry area an hour and a half, prior to service start time. Our kitchen is utilized on Wednesdays for food distribution, from 12pm-4pm. We ask that this area be clean and clear in preparation for the distribution. In addition, our gymnasium is used for practices Tuesdays and Thursdays 2:30pm-5:30pm. Please fold and stack any tables and chairs against the wall while not in use.

Sleeping Locations:

The main children's area and classrooms 1-4 are available for sleeping locations. We ask that during the service and practice times mentioned above, that all sleeping bags and personal belongings be stored in classroom 3 and there is extra space in the tower closet next to elevator and closet next to stage. All of the other classrooms need to be available for usage on service days. If additional space is needed due to group size, the gymnasium can be used as a separate sleeping location.

Kitchen/Pantry:

We have a designated area for your food, snacks, and supplies. Please let us know if you have any special needs. Please make sure no open food is left out and that everything is either covered or put in the refrigerator.

For your safety and the safety of your team:

We ask that no one walks to gas stations or any stores by the church and minimize any activity outside once night comes. Please make sure no outside doors to the offices or church buildings are left propped open. If any of your team is approached by a stranger from the area with request for money or food, please direct them to one of the Revival Tabernacle staff members.

When Leaving Revival Tabernacle During Non-Business Hours:

- * Turn off all lights in designated sleeping areas. Light panel for gymnasium lights, is located in gym closet on left hand side wall. *Only the first 3 switches on left side panel are used to turn on/off lights.*
- * Ensure that the front door is closed. Set alarm by pressing "Away" and entering code, and then you have 60 seconds to exit the front door.
- * Keys and Alarm code will be given to designated group team leader.

When Staying and Turning In For the Night:

*Ensure all entry/exit doors are closed. Set alarm by pressing "Stay." This will allow only the entry/exit doors to be armed and the motion detectors to be disabled to allow for the facility to be armed while activity happens inside the facility.

STREETWISE IN THE CITY

DON'T LOOK LIKE A TOURIST

Walking is a great pastime. On foot, you get to see the city and the faces of Detroiters up close and personal. You can pray for them as you go*. There are fun places to explore as well. When you decide to walk, walk purposefully! Be aware of what is happening around you, not by turning your head and looking, but by using your peripheral vision and your ears. A purposeful gait and a resolute stride go a long way in preventing a would-be pick pocketer from invading your space or violating your person. Be cautious of who is around you at all times and pay attention to people who bump into you as it may be a diversion to take some of your belongings.

WHAT DO I DO WITH MY PURSE?

It is strongly advisable to use a purse that has a thick strap and zips or closes rather than carrying an open bag. Wear it crossed over your body or at least near your side. The idea is to not let it swing freely aside or behind you. Do not carry a lot of cash.

HOW ABOUT MY WALLET?

Do not put a lot of cash in your wallet but use it for your ID purposes. The best place to carry cash or credit cards is in your front pocket. Never carry all of your cards at once.

PUBLIC TRANSPORTATION

The system here in Detroit is not very reliable so we encourage you to use cars at all times.

MEETING PEOPLE'S NEEDS

You will inevitably meet many people who will approach you and ask for money. This is where you must use wisdom and discernment, as we cannot tell you how to spend your money. Some may really need it. However, others may want to take advantage of you so here is what we suggest you do: refer them to the nearest resource center that can provide food, shelter, of both. First, offer to buy a meal and try to discern what the money is really needed for, as it may be best that you do not make a habit of giving money away. It is overwhelming and may not be helpful to the individual. Some may want just to be heard, be sensitive to the Holy Spirit in either case.

*As you encounter situations that you may not know how to handle, or things that break your heart, you may want to stop and pray as a team. Of course, we encourage you to look to the Father in all things. However, we also want to make sure that you are aware of your surroundings. While it may be appropriate to form a circle for prayer on campus or in other settings, it is not necessarily the wisest thing to do in the city. We suggest that you walk and pray...all the while being aware of what is going on around you.
